






TREE TYPES	DESCRIPTION
<p>NOBLE</p> 	<p>Beautiful soft green-blue needles, neat compact branches and a heavenly fragrance make this tree a popular choice. Excellent needle retention and strong dense foliage.</p> <p>The noble is by far the most popular Christmas tree with its strong, evenly spaced branches and tailored look. Un-sheared, there is plenty of space to hang ornaments.</p>
<p>NORDMAN</p> 	<p>Bushy, with straight branches and glossy needles. Excellent needle holding qualities. Beautiful, dark, glossy green needles that are longer than most fir and drape a bit on the branch. This tree has a more open graceful habit, showing off its silvery trunk. Strong branches good for hanging ornaments.</p>
<p>FRASER</p> 	<p>This fir has needles that are a short, lustrous dark green and curved. Strong and durable tiered branches, often with pine cones still attached. The Fraser Fir tends to grow with a more compact, upright habit making it a good choice for smaller rooms.</p> <p>Branches are held at an upward angle. The tree is often very open although some of these trees have been tip-pruned to encourage denser growth.</p>
<p>GRAND</p> 	<p>Easily distinguished from other Pacific Northwest firs by its flattened sprays of lustrous needles in two distinct rows. They are usually horizontally spread so that both the upper and lower sides of the branches are clearly visible. The Grand is typically sheared to increase density and give the tree a perfect cone shape. This tree is considered the most fragrant.</p>
<p>DOUGLAS FIR</p> 	<p>Classic Pacific NW tree! Soft needles are dark green-blue in color and are approximately 1 - 1/4 inches in length. The Douglas Fir needles radiate in all directions from the branch. When crushed, these needles have a sweet fragrance. Nice dense tree!</p>
